2008 FIELD OF DREAMS

Athletics director creates inner-city lacrosse program BY DAWN REISS



As an art history major at Indiana University, Sam Angelotta, BA'08, jokes that everyone always asked what he would do with his life after graduation.

"It was the exposure to new ideas that was really conducive to thinking differently about what I was going to do with my life," says Angelotta, who played lacrosse on IU's club team. "It allowed me to think creatively and develop my own career path versus just falling in line."

After graduation, Angelotta took a 10-month job coaching lacrosse while playing semi-professionally in Manchester, England.

"You're in the epicenter of the soccer universe when you're in Manchester," says Angelotta, who played and coached for the Manchester Waconians Lacrosse Club. "There was an opportunity for kids who weren't great soccer players to try something new. Not always being the best lacrosse player made me understand the fundamentals of the game. That translated into being a pretty good coach."

Angelotta returned to the U.S. and decided he wanted to teach and coach. He eventually began student teaching at St. Malachy School, on Chicago's povertystricken West Side, in 2011 and created a non-profit organization called OWLS-Outreach With Lacrosse and Schools.

"I was researching after-school programs and where they fall short," Angelotta says. "We found an epidemic of physical inactivity levels among innercity youth. I wanted to start a lacrosse program to combat that."

Over the past four years, the program has grown from 10 middle schoolers with donated gear into a 501c3 with more than 100 athletes, a board of directors for a league of five Chicago schools (five boys and two girls teams), and a community-based team that is coached by volunteers.

"Now gear is the least of our issues," he says. "It's our organizational capacity and growing demand and trying to keep up with that financially."

To keep his lacrosse players motivated, Angelotta has scheduled college field trips, which included playing during halftime of an ESPN-televised Notre Dame-Army lacrosse game.

"It's all about giving them something to look forward to," says Angelotta, who is now St. Malachy's athletics director and also coaches flag football and basketball. "By exposing them to institutions of higher learning, we are giving them something to look forward to and giving them a reason to want to go to college."
